# Small Talk Where small voices can be heard

nationally accredited child advocacy center, Small Talk provides a safe, comfortable, child-friendly place to guide children through the trauma of abuse.

At Small Talk, professionals in the fields of child protection, law enforcement, prosecution, mental health, medicine and victim advocacy work together to investigate abuse, hold offenders accountable—and help children heal.

"We facilitate hope and growth," says Alex Brace, MA, LPC, executive director and crisis counselor. "Children have the opportunity to use their voice to help themselves heal."

The seeds of Small Talk were sown in 2011, when concerned community members, including law enforcement and prosecutors, believed there "had to be a better way" to help children during the abuse investigation and beyond. As one young victim's parent put it, said Alex, "What now?"

A collaboration of concerned parties set out to create an answer to that question.

Partnering with the Michigan chapter of the National Children's Alliance, they began a child advocacy center with Alex as its first employee, counseling children in a donated space in the Ingham County prosecutor's office. By 2014, the organization was able to move to its own space. And in January 2016, with the support of founders, staff, board, professionals and community partners, Small Talk moved into its state-of-the-art center in Delhi Township.

Today, Small Talk has three licensed therapists/crisis counselors and a forensic interviewer/prevention specialist. Awareness is a critical piece of child abuse prevention, says Alex, so Small Talk is active in raising community awareness.

"We know we have to be reactive," he says, "but we want to be proactive, too."

Small Talk is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit corporation, and provides its intake and counseling services at no cost. Its operating budget is sustained through grants and donations.

# Realize Cedar

Project will create distinctive town center





ealize Cedar is a redevelopment plan for Cedar Street—a new vision designed to improve infrastructure and create a town center with unique character and charm.

"We're striving to create a 'sense of place' in the downtown area," said Delhi Downtown Development Authority (DDA) Executive Director Howard Haas, "where residents and businesses can mingle in a walkable town center." And, he added, a place that will help attract new businesses to the area.

Described as "the future of Holt," the project plan was developed—after gathering public input—by a township steering committee in conjunction with community planning and design firm McKenna Associates. The Delhi Township Planning Commission adopted the plan on Oct. 24, 2016, after a public hearing, and the Board of Trustees accepted the plan on Nov. 1, 2016.

"Cedar Street and downtown Holt have been a focal point of Delhi Township planning for more than 20 years," said Haas. "Multiple studies have supported its redevelopment."

Although some redevelopment has been done in the past, Haas noted, the Realize Cedar initiative includes updated traffic studies, design solutions and market data.

Funding for the project will *not* come from tax increases or special assessments, Haas emphasized. The Township will pay for its portion of the infrastructure changes with DDA funds (tax dollars recaptured by the DDA that would otherwise leave the township for regional entities) and the project is also eligible for grant funding and federal dollars.



### A look back at the Delhi Township Pioneer Cemetery project

Delhi Township's Pioneer Cemetery is aptly named. Established in 1853 and listed in the Michigan State Register of Historic Sites, it is the resting place of more than 200 of our township's earliest residents.

In 2010, the Delhi DDA launched an improvement project to replace the crumbling wall around the cemetery and upgrade the site's overall appearance. A new stone retaining wall, stone steps to the cemetery's entrance and new landscaping now grace the historic site.

Pioneer Cemetery is on North Aurelius Road north of Cedar Street.

hen *Our Town* last visited Holt Eye Care, co-owners Brian Houser, O.D., and his wife, Amy Cousineau, O.D., were preparing to move to a new, larger location. Now, in January 2017, the practice is celebrating its 15th anniversary.

"We're bigger and busier," says Dr. Houser. "We're kind of excited about where we've been and where we're going."

That includes advanced instruments and technology that help the doctors check the entire visual system and detect conditions such as dry eye, cataracts, macular degeneration and glaucoma. In fact, says Houser, many times there are ocular symptoms that may suggest an overall health concern such as diabetes, high blood pressure, lupus, or rheumatoid arthritis.

"It is our job as optometrists to monitor the health of your eyes as well as your overall well-being," he said.
