Construction set to kick off this spring

The new vision for downtown Holt is coming to life.

Construction has officially begun for Realize Cedar, a project that will redevelop the Cedar Street corridor across Delhi Township and create a more livable, walkable community that attracts new businesses and residents, creates jobs and boosts local property values.

The project will include improved sidewalks, street parking, and updated infrastructure to create a safe community for all age groups, including millennials, families, and seniors.

“The project will help create a more livable and walkable community that appeals to people of all ages,” said Howard Haas, Executive Director of the Delhi Township DDA. “It will be a win-win for residents, businesses, and visitors through improved motorist and pedestrian safety, better traffic flow and by connecting our community in new ways.”

The early stages of construction began in March, and the project is scheduled to conclude around the end of the year. During construction, northbound traffic on Cedar Street will be maintained at all times, while southbound traffic will have a short detour.

Businesses and residents will have access to their properties throughout the project.

“Realize Cedar construction will create a temporary inconvenience, but will pay dividends in the long-run by creating a welcoming community for businesses, residents, and visitors,” Haas said “The township will work hand-in-hand with all Cedar Street businesses so they can stay open during construction and will regularly communicate traffic and other restrictions to businesses and nearby residents from start to finish.”

Delhi Township and the township’s Downtown Development Authority (DDA) have extensively studied the impact of the proposed project on the local economy. From the start, the township has worked with residents, business owners, and other stakeholders on planning Realize Cedar to create a vibrant downtown that attracts residents, businesses, and jobs while boosting local property values.

Delhi Township and the township’s DDA have moved forward with the implementation of this important infrastructure project, which will result in economic development that will benefit the entire community. Engineering firm Hubbell, Roth & Clark, Inc. (HRC) will carry out the construction on the project.



Quality Dairy to reopen in Holt

In just a matter of weeks, Holt residents will be able to enjoy Quality Dairy ice cream, donuts, chocolate milk, and other delicious treats again. Their Holt location is set to reopen in mid-May.

“We’re hoping to develop this site into more of the QD of the future,” said Ken Martin, the president and co-owner of Quality Dairy.

Late last year, an electrical fire at the Holt location forced the store to temporarily shut its doors. Around the same time, Quality Dairy leadership was looking to make updates to the family-owned regional chain. They asked for community suggestions on how to improve their Holt location.

The community responded through social media, and Quality Dairy listened. Holt’s Quality Dairy will serve as the chain’s new “concept store,” a combination of the most popular customer requests and a sneak-peek into the Quality Dairies of the future.

“What I picture is the corner creamery,” Martin said. “We’re hoping to basically create a really good family environment.”

It will include more prepared foods,

a small kitchen area, and updated technology. It will also feature a walk-up window with soft serve and hand dipped ice cream, milkshakes, and an ice cream topping bar. During the summer months, customers will be able to enjoy their ice cream outside in a relaxing and attractive sitting area.

Martin envisions his corner creamery being a popular stop for folks traveling on the growing network of bike lanes and walking trails in Holt. He also hopes to catch the eyes of drivers and pedestrians enjoying the new Realize Cedar project that will be implemented this year. Martin sees the synergy that Quality Dairy will have with the new downtown feel created by the project.

The company has drastically evolved since Martin’s father first opened in Lansing in 1936. From a neighborhood dairy, to a 30-store strong convenience store chain, Martin said Quality Dairy has flourished over the years by really listening to their customers.

“When you have a direct relationship with the customer, you treat them as well as you can,” he said. “That’s our plan for the future: Continue to stay close to the customer and possibly stay ahead of what they’re looking for.”

When mold of any variety is growing in a home, residents will frequently experience a specific set of symptoms: sore throat, sneezing, itchy and watery eyes, and itchy ears.

Dusseau says that it’s important to know the warning signs of mold before it starts to impact your health. A mildewy, musky smell is often one of the first signs. Also, look out for a visible white film on wood or dark spots on your drywall.

To prevent mold, the Rapid Mold Removal team recommends keeping your basements and crawl spaces free from any moisture. Identify any potential leaks and fix them as soon as possible, use a dehumidifier, keep up on sump pump maintenance, and ensure that water doesn’t pool next to your foundation.

When particularly wet seasons do come, like the one the greater Lansing area saw this spring, Rapid Mold Removal is always there help catch the early signs of mold, clean affected areas, and keep your family safe.

said. “But knowing that these homes are in the hands of our amazing technicians means it will all work out.”



Advanced technology in a comfortable atmosphere

For some patients, choosing between the advanced technology of a large-scale practice and the homey atmosphere of a smaller office is difficult. Not for the patients at the GI Clinic in Lansing.

“A lot of new advancements are being made and we’re on the cutting edge,” said Debbie Reid, the office manager of the practice.

The GI Clinic is made up of two gastroenterologists and a small team of medical professionals. Dr. Salim Jaffer, MD, and Dr. Allison Wood, DO started the private practice in 2017. Both doctors see patients in the office two days a week and spend the remaining time performing gastrointestinal procedures at McLaren Hospital.

Patients visit the office for a range of digestive and intestinal issues, everything from acid reflux and irritable bowel syndrome, to intestinal polyps and colon cancer.

One of those most advanced diagnostic and exploratory procedures they offer is capsule endoscopy, where the patient swallows a capsule sized camera that takes thousands of photos of the inside of the digestive system, helping physicians identify inflammation, bleeding, or cancer in

areas that would otherwise be unreachable.

Though the small practice is proud of their high-quality technology, they know it’s no substitute for personalized patient care.


“We’re in a small, private office,” Reid said. “It’s cozy and homey. People just like being comfy in here and we talk to them like they’re one of the family.”

Each patient is treated as an individual, and while advanced procedures may provide relief for some patients, others may need simple dietary recommendations or lifestyle changes to ease their symptoms.

Regardless of which procedure is right for each patient, it’s all about helping people find relief.

“Our patients are first and foremost, and we always go above and beyond to make sure they’re taken care of,” Reid said.

Construction projects within our community and state will soon begin. These projects will fix the very roads we have been bitterly cursing with every pothole our tires slam into.

Take a moment in the morning to remember everything before you leave the house. Coffee, phone, keys, sunglasses patience?

Time has become the single precious commodity we can little afford to give away. There are so many demands on our time that we are unable to process the overload. This can lead to a breakdown of civility, patience, and understanding. It can also create dangerous environments in all aspects of life. These dangers are amplified inside 4,000 pounds of steel set in motion on a roadway.

Your neighbors will be the people completing these construction projects. They work for the Lansing Board of Water & Light, Consumers Energy, Ingham County Road Department, Delhi Township Public Works, and many private construction, paving, concrete and barricading companies. Drive slow, limit distractions, and leave five minutes earlier than you have in the past.

Distractions such as eating, cell phone use, or loud music can erode our focus. Please devote your time and full attention to the most important facet of life at that very moment — driving. Also, be patient and follow the motor vehicle code. As tempting as it may be, wait at traffic signals and do not attempt to circumvent the lights. Taking a shortcut through a private business parking lot to avoid the traffic signal is a civil infraction. The law is MCL 257.611 Use of Private Property to Avoid Traffic Control Device. Another common violation associated with time demands or lack of patience is running through a changing or red light. This violation is also a civil infraction that is MCL 257.612(1)(b) Disregard Steady Yellow Signal.


There is light at the end of the repair tunnel. These projects are what we all have been asking for. Be patient and show the people around you the true character you possess as a member of this community.


