Promoting volunteerism in Holt

Meet Melanie McNamara

Melanie McNamara is Delhi Townships' new volunteer bureau coordinator, a new position within the Holt Non Profit Coalition, a 501(c)(3) organization started by the Delhi Downtown Development Authority, that aims to connect volunteers in the community with organizations in need of extra help.

"There's a whole spectrum of ways to volunteer in Holt," McNamara said.

Whether people want to set up a weekly volunteer commitment with a local organization, coordinate a community event, or simply help out on a free afternoon, there are many organizations throughout the community in need of volunteers.

McNamara and the Holt Non Profit Coalition are looking to build a database of organizations in need of volunteers and community volunteers looking for new ways to get involved. The database will help strengthen community connections.

McNamara felt this community support on a personal level. When she developed breast cancer a few years ago, her family, friends, and community rallied around her and hosted a benefit in her honor at Buddies Grill. Now, a two-year cancer survivor, she's looking for ways to give back. When she heard about the job opening, she jumped at the opportunity to apply.

"I love helping," she said. "I love connecting people and I think it sounds really exciting to meet with different people and help them make connections."

McNamara and her family have lived in the Holt area for the last 15 years and have fallen in love with the

"I see many people who are really involved in the community and the school system and it's very inspiring," she said.

Right now, McNamara is working on identifying Delhi Township organizations in need of volunteer help and recording their calendar of events and general needs. Rick Anthony's Flower Shoppe More than 50 years of personalized service



or Rick Anthony, owner of Rick Anthony's Flower Shoppe in Holt and Lansing, one of the best parts about being a florist is walking alongside his customers through some of their biggest moments in life.

"We're involved in our customers' personal lives-from their birth of their children to the death of their loved ones and all phases in between," he said. "Birthdays, anniversaries, holidays. They all want to do business with someone that they can trust."

Anthony has built that trust with his customers over his 53 year career in the trade. He was born and raised in the flower business, and started working for his father's florist shop, Jon Anthony's Florist, when he was only 14 years old. When he turned 18, he started up his own florist shop on North Grand River Avenue in Lansing.

Anthony and his growing family relocated to Holt and heard from lots of friends and neighbors that they would be happy to do business with Rick Anthony's Flower Shoppe if there was a location closer to home. That's when Anthony opened up his first shop next to Sweet Sensations on Cedar Street. Over the 25 years that Rick Anthony's Flower Shoppe has been in Holt, it's moved to two other locations on Cedar Street, finally landing at its current location around 14 years ago.

Today, Rick Anthony's Flower Shoppe is a thriving family business. Anthony handles the management of his two store locations, but mostly stays at the Lansing location while his wife Carole and daughter Randi Kay handle operations in Holt. As a family, they sometimes have to sacrifice a lot in order to provide for their customers. Anthony can think of several times throughout his career where vacations or family get-togethers were cut short by a

rush flower order. While he does have a dedicated team of parttime employees, last-minute jobs often require all hands on deck.

"If you want to have any kind of success in this business, you have to be ready for these kinds of interruptions," he said. "That's what makes it a unique and demanding business. We offer very personalized service."

But despite its challenges, Anthony has loved being a part of the business and watching it transform over his career.

"The Internet has completely changed the way people order flowers," he said. Today, Anthony estimates that 80-90 percent of his business comes from Internet orders.

And he'll remain ready for new changes ahead. In the coming years, Anthony said he and his wife Carole are considering leaving their business to their children after more than 50 years of running the family-owned shop.

"It's been very rewarding," he said of his long career in the business. "It makes you feel like you've accomplished something very important. The reward comes from the realization that you're doing something for somebody that's really appreciative."

Gravity Smokehouse: Smoking the competition

In just over a year, Bruce Kring and his business partners have gone from a fun "what-if" idea to launching their very own restaurant.

Gravity Smokehouse & BBQ, which has been operating as a food truck traveling around central Michigan for the past five months, will become Holt's newest BBQ restaurant this winter. "It wasn't originally part of the plan," Kring said. "But the opportunity presented itself and we said, 'why not?"

Kring and his partner, James Stine, tossed around the idea of starting a food truck as a fun alternative to their 9-5 jobs. They started the Gravity Smokehouse & BBQ food truck in June and originally decided to keep their reach small. But customers kept coming.

The BBQ joint features brisket, chicken, pork, turkey ribs and any variation of those you can think of. For carb-lovers and vegetarians, they serve specialty mac and cheese that strikes the right balance of creaminess and flavor sophistication.

Stine left his full-time job to start running the food truck full time. Then last spring, the team found out about an opportunity to buy the former Hot N' Now building on Cedar Street. Shortly after closing on the property, Kring left his full-time job to start tackling the details of opening up a new restaurant.

The team is currently working on remodeling the facility, adding some extra indoor space and even including a drive-through. Depending on paperwork and construction progress, the team hopes to open up the restaurant in early 2019. In the spring, the team plans to add even more outdoor seating options, an attractive and convenient option for those who frequently travel the new trail on Cedar Street.

Stine and Kring both grew up in Holt and met while they were students at Holt Junior High. Both had strong ties to the restaurant industry growing up but went on to pursue other jobs into their adulthoods. But something kept pulling them back to their shared passion for food.

"That's how the gravity theme came back to be," Kring said. And if there's one thing Kring and his team have learned from their exponential growth over the past year, it's that you can't fight gravity. "Our business philosophy is 'just go for it.' Go for that one thing that's been pulling at you. Don't be afraid to do it."

or Randi Kay Anthony, owner of Fusion Dance Center, teaching kids how to dance is about much more than perfecting a pirouette or mastering a leap.

"We're trying to teach the kids to win with humility and lose with humility," she said. "We want kids to respect themselves. We always just say that we're trying to change the world one dancer at at time."

Anthony has been teaching dance for 22 years. After finishing school, she pursued a brief professional career, dancing for companies in Chicago and Los Angeles. But she quickly discovered that she preferred working with kids in the studio over the dog-eat-dog world of professional dance.

"My heart is in teaching," she said. "There's so many things kids can learn from dance: responsibility, reliability, being part of team, organizational skills, time management. I feel like kids these days don't have a lot of positive influences and school can be really difficult. I try to provide a place that's a safe haven but also teaches work ethic and things like that."

Fusion Dance Center first opened its doors 25 years ago, and Anthony worked at the studio as a teacher under the previous owner. Seven years ago, the previous owner decided to retire and handed the studio over to Anthony. Today, she is continuing to build upon the legacy of the studio and her predecessor.

Students travel from all over central Michigan to dance at Fusion Dance Center. At regional and national competitions, Anthony's students consistently win scholarships and top prizes for choreography and performance. The secret, Anthony says, is having committed educators.

"One of the things that sets us apart from anybody else is that I'm very picky about who teaches for me," she said "I don't have a high turnover rate in teachers. We are very passionate about what we do. We're not in it for the money. I think that comes through to your students."

Her staff of nine dance teachers help support a growing roster of more than 150 dancers. The Fusion Dance Center team wants each dancer to get the most out of their classes, so they often pursue opportunities to expand their own dance and teaching skills.

"We all continue to learn from each other," Anthony said. "We are constantly going to workshops, classes in New York, conventions, anything we can to further our educations."

The teachers love to see students surpass their own expectations, Anthony says, and each teacher at the studio is committed to helping the dancers grow as athletes and as individuals.

"I love seeing kids accomplish something they didn't think they could," she said. "It's so cool to see their excitement. Because that fuels them to want to keep going. Dance is not something that you can accomplish in a year. There's always more turns. There's always higher jumps. But to see them actually accomplish something and to see that expression on their face is priceless."
