


Incu-BaKe

Shared-use kitchen supports food entrepreneurs



o people clamor for your homemade cookies? Sing the praises of your salsa? Have you ever dreamed of taking your food talents to the marketplace, only to be thwarted by the need for a commercial kitchen? That's why there's Incu-BaKe.

Incu-BaKe is a state-of-the-art, fully-licensed commercial kitchen available to rent by the hour. It's the realization of a dream for owner Marcy Bishop Kates—and she hopes it will help others realize theirs as well.

Marcy's dream began in autumn of 2010, when she was asked to do some catering but couldn't find a part-time commercial kitchen to rent. Marcy wanted to follow the laws regulating commercial food preparation, but wasn't prepared to "sink big bucks into building a commercial kitchen." While looking for a solution, she said, "It quickly became obvious to me that there are a lot of cooks like me who want to explore their food dreams."

Marcy began searching for the right location to make a shared-use kitchen a reality. In April 2011, she found it. By the end of July, renovation was complete and Incu-BaKe received its commercial kitchen license.

Although shared-use kitchens are not uncommon elsewhere in the country, there are only a handful in Michigan, and IncuBaKe is the only one in the greater Lansing area. Marcy believes Incu-BaKe can be part of the equation to help develop and expand Michigan's local food businesses. "I strongly believe that local foods hold one of the keys to a recovering Michigan economy," Marcy said, and she wants to help others grow their own small

food businesses. This includes those who are ready to expand beyond the limitations of the state's "cottage foods" regulations, or those who would like to teach food classes or workshops.

Even those who don't want to start a food business may need a larger kitchen occasionally, Marcy pointed out. So Incu-BaKe is also available for "social" use such as canning or cookie parties and food tastings—not to mention that it also boasts a world-class meat smoker. Nonprofits and other organizations that need to cook for fundraisers may also wish to rent kitchen space there.

Incu-BaKe is set up to provide a comfortable, safe atmosphere for its clients. In addition to the kitchen facilities, it also houses a lunch/lounge area, a resource library of cookbooks and other food-related books, small business resources, and a variety of unique business incubator services.

"Local foods issues have become increasingly important to me over the past few years," said Marcy, who serves as chair of the Holt Farmers' Market advisory board and is a frequent visitor at many of the local farmers' markets and roadside stands. On any given day, Jason said, Block Imaging Parts & Service has approximately 100 contract engineers in the field throughout the country and internationally, servicing clients' imaging equipment.



hallenge is nothing new for Moore Trosper Construction Company. After all, it was founded in 1982, one of the worst years on record for the construction industry. Yet nearly 30 years later, the company is still here.

The economy of recent years "has helped us think outside the box," said Brian Moore, co-president. "You have to these days. You can't count on doing one thing and one thing only."

Far from it. Moore Trosper is also a tribal-member-owned company, as the Moores are members of the Sault Ste. Marie tribe of Chippewa Indians. "Because of our Native American heritage, we have developed relationships with other Native American tribes in Michigan," said Brian. The company is in the process of being certified through the Michigan Minority Business Development Council (MMBDC).

MTCC employs 11 people in the office and 60-70 in the field—the latter having fluctuated over the past few years with the economy. As a union company, Brian said, they can draw additional manpower from the union when needed, allowing the company to keep their core group busy. "A lot of our guys have been here for a long time," he explained. "I personally feel responsible for all these families that work for us."

The shakes are made with soy protein, and Erin said they have choices that are appropriate for those with diabetes or dietary restrictions.
